SUBJECT: NOTICE OF REQUESTED WAIVER FROM AYP CALCULATION FOR HAITIAN REFUGEE STUDENTS

As you know, Commissioner Eric Smith exercised state statutory authority to exempt from FCAT testing (for the spring 2010 test administrations) all children who immigrated or were evacuated from Haiti to Florida after the date of the earthquake in Haiti earlier this year (January 12, 2010). Commissioner Eric Smith also sent a letter to U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan requesting exemption of these earthquake-affected Haitian students from the reading and math participation rate components of the Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) calculation for Florida schools for the 2009-10 reporting year. Note that these students would have no impact on the proficiency calculations for AYP because only full-year-enrolled students are included in these measures. However, because Florida uses the February (Survey 3) student reporting count as a basis for calculating participation rates for AYP in reading and math, earthquake refugees who were enrolled during the Survey 3 reporting period could potentially affect AYP participation rate outcomes, unless these students are exempted from these measures as well.

In reviewing Florida's waiver request described above, the U.S. Department of Education has requested that the Florida Department of Education provide summary data on the count of earthquake-affected refugees, notify school districts (local education agencies, LEAs) of the requested waiver, and solicit public comments/feedback on the requested waiver.

This memorandum serves as notice of the AYP waiver request for Haitian refugees for the 2010 calculation. The table on the following page provides counts, by district, of earthquake-displaced refugees who were enrolled in Florida public schools during the Survey 3 (2009-10) reporting period.

SUBJECT: School Enrollment for Displaced Haitians

In the aftermath of the earthquake in Haiti, displaced Haitians have begun to arrive in Florida. With their arrival, it is expected that children of school age will be enrolling in Florida's public schools. To plan for the accommodation of these students, it will be necessary for the Department to begin a collection of counts of students new to Florida schools as a result of this disaster.

Beginning this afternoon, staff from Education Information and Accountability Services will call your district asking for a count of students who have recently come from Haiti and enrolled in your district as a result of the disaster. It is expected that a daily count will be made to provide planning information for all of the organizations that may be affected as a result of the influx of new students. While most of the new enrollees are likely to be in the southern part of Florida, it is possible that some of the new students may relocate throughout the state. The Department plans to continue this count through mid-February, at which time it will evaluate the need to collect further counts and notify districts accordingly.

Effective with the February FTE Count via the Automated Student Data Base, the data element currently called "Hurricane Affected Student" will be renamed "Hurricane/Earthquake Affected Student." This element will form the basis for official reports regarding students new to Florida schools as a result of the earthquake. Two new codes (E and Q) have been added to describe the action as a result of the earthquake. These codes are:

- Y Yes, this student moved to this district this school year due to a hurricane.
- E Yes, this student moved to this district this school year due to an earthquake.
- W Yes, this student changed schools within this district this school year due to a hurricane.
- Q Yes, this student changed schools within this district this school year due to an earthquake.
- Z No, this student did not move to this district and did not change schools within this district this school year due to a hurricane/earthquake.

Special attention should be paid to the reporting format Prior School Status/Student Attendance for the February reporting period. The elements dealing with entry codes and prior school locations will likely form the basis for decisions during the next few months. Please provide a reminder to all of your school-based data staff regarding the critical nature of these items.

Additionally, districts should follow all applicable federal and state laws regarding admittance of students and requirements for immunizations.

Regarding statewide assessment, section 1008.22 (3)(c)6. of the Florida Statutes requires that all students attending public school in Florida participate in the statewide assessment program but also gives authority to the Commissioner for exceptions. Commissioner Smith is exercising this authority for all children who immigrated or have been evacuated from Haiti to Florida after the date of the recent earthquake (January 12, 2010). The Commissioner understands that these children have experienced profound trauma, may arrive with no documentation or educational records, and have received no instruction in our schools. These students will be exempt from participation in the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test of Writing, Reading, Mathematics and Science, the Florida Alternate Assessment, as well as any field-test administrations of end-of-course or other assessments during the spring of 2010.

Districts must provide placement assessments for these immigrants/evacuees to determine what English language skills the children may have and administer the CELLA as appropriate.

There is no impact of excluding these students from statewide assessment in proficiency calculations for school grades or AYP because they are not full-year-enrolled students. If students are enrolled prior to Survey 3, this exclusion would impact AYP participation rate calculations for reading and mathematics. The Department will request an emergency waiver from this requirement from the U.S. Department of Education.

In the coming weeks, the Department will reach out to teachers directly through the *Just for Teachers* electronic newsletter and to parents through existing channels with parent/teacher associations in order to provide an update on the actions of our Department and the efforts of our fellow state agencies. Please feel free to contact my office or appropriate Department staff with any questions that arise during this transition period.

This is a waiver request to exempt certain Haitian students (earthquake refugees) from the reading and math participation rate components of the Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) calculation for Florida schools for the 2009-10 reporting year. The following information should provide justification for this request.

To assist with continuing relief efforts in the wake of Haiti's recent catastrophic earthquake, the State of Florida is mobilizing resources to provide assistance for displaced students from Haiti. The Florida Department of Education has been meeting with Florida's Emergency Operations team that includes the state's Department of Children and Families and Department of Health, and is prepared to work with this team to address issues that may arise regarding enrolling and educating these students. Florida's proximity to the earthquake region makes our state the closest point of entry into the United States for these displaced persons. Providing shelter and safety for them is a top priority. Some may require medical care.

In concert with these operations, Florida's school districts will lend a hand by providing a smooth school enrollment process for children in displaced families who are relocating to counties in our state. This process has already begun in a number of Florida school districts as displaced persons, including orphans, arrive. Enrollments of Haitian students (specifically, those enrolling after January 12, 2010) are being tracked through Florida's automated student data reporting system and show increasing counts daily in key areas of south and central Florida.

Regarding statewide assessment, section 1008.22 (3)(c)6. of the Florida Statutes requires that all students attending public school in Florida participate in the statewide assessment program but

also gives authority to Florida's Commissioner of Education for exceptions. Commissioner Eric Smith is exercising this authority for all children who immigrated or have been evacuated from Haiti to Florida after the date of the recent earthquake (January 12, 2010). The Commissioner understands that these children have experienced profound trauma, may arrive with no documentation or educational records, and have received no instruction in our schools. For the spring of 2010, these students will be exempt from participation in the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test of Writing, Reading, Mathematics, and Science; the Florida Alternate Assessment (for students with significant cognitive disabilities); and any field-test administrations of end-of-course or other assessments during this term.

Florida school districts must provide placement assessments for these immigrants/evacuees to determine what English language skills the children may have and administer the Comprehensive English Language Learning Assessment (CELLA) as appropriate.

There is no impact of excluding these students from statewide assessment in proficiency calculations for state-administered school grades or federally required AYP determinations because these students are not full-year-enrolled students (and thereby would not be eligible for inclusion). However, students enrolling by the February reporting period (Florida's "Survey 3" data collection period) may impact AYP participation rate calculations for reading and mathematics, as statewide tests are administered later in the spring term and Florida bases its AYP participation rate on students who are reported as enrolled in the Survey 3 period.

Because of the extraordinary circumstances described above, I am requesting that Florida be granted a waiver to exempt students who are incoming Haitian refugees (those who enrolled after January 12, 2010, and who have been granted an emergency waiver from assessment on statewide examinations) from inclusion in Florida's 2009-10 AYP participation rate calculations in reading and math.

If/when you or your staff should require additional information on the situation as it evolves in Florida, we will be happy to assist.

SUBJECT: ASSISTANCE TO DISPLACED STUDENTS FROM HAITI – WAIVER OF THE SPRING ADMINISTRATION OF FCAT

This communication is intended to provide further clarification regarding waiver of the spring administration of the FCAT for students who have emigrated from Haiti since the recent earthquake disaster. The Commissioner of Education has authority to grant exceptions for participation in administration of the FCAT; however, the Commissioner does not have authority to waive promotion or graduation requirements.

Haitian students who have arrived in Florida since the disaster and are identified as third grade student transfers may elect not to take the spring 2010 Grade 3 FCAT. Such students would be viewed the same as any transfer student who enrolls in Florida's public school system after the spring FCAT administration. Students may still be promoted if they qualify for a good cause exemption pursuant to Section 1008.25(6), Florida Statutes. Good cause exemptions can be granted based on acceptable performance on an approved alternate assessment, demonstration of proficiency through a student portfolio, or if the student has been assessed as a Limited English Proficient (LEP) student and has been provided less than two years of ESOL instruction.

Haitian students who have arrived in Florida since the disaster and are identified as sophomore, junior or senior transfers may elect not to participate in the spring Grade 10 FCAT. Juniors who will become seniors for the 2010-11 school year will have two more attempts in their senior year.

A student who transfers into the Florida public school system for the first time in Grade 12 is not required to take and fail the reading and mathematics Grade 10 FCAT three times in order to use a passing concordant score in lieu of a passing FCAT score. Therefore, for students in Grade 12, a concordant score may be used to fulfill the requirements for a regular diploma.

Students are encouraged to participate in the Spring 2010 FCAT Administration but are not required to do so. If a student elects to not participate in the statewide assessment, statute requires that the district provide the student's parent or guardian with information on the implications of that decision on promotion or graduation decisions.

The Department is offering assistance to those Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) that have experienced an increase in the number of homeless children due to the 2010 Haitian earthquake. The Department will award up to \$75,000 total to those LEAs that have identified 40 or more homeless students displaced by the recent earthquake. Awards may range from \$18,000 to \$75,000, depending upon the number of applicants. Please find attached the RFA. Applicants are encouraged to apply on or by March 5, 2010, so funding may begin on that date; therefore, a timely submission is required.

LEAs may use these funds to:

- Defray the excess cost of transportation for homeless students not otherwise provided through federal, state, or local funding.
- Extraordinary or emergency assistance needed to enable homeless children and youths to attend school.
- Services and assistance to attract, engage, and retain homeless children and youths and unaccompanied youth in public school programs and services provided to nonhomeless children and youths.
- Professional development and other activities that are designed to heighten the understanding and sensitivity of personnel to the needs of homeless children and youths, their rights, and the specific educational needs of runaway and homeless youths.

- Programs coordinating services provided by schools and other agencies to eligible students in order to expand and enhance such services.

- Provision of school supplies to eligible students at shelters, temporary housing facilities, and other locations as appropriate.
- Tutoring, supplemental instruction, and other educational services.
- Expedited evaluations of eligible students to measure their strengths and needs.
- Referrals of eligible students to medical, dental, mental, and other health services.
- Developmentally appropriate early childhood education programs for homeless children of preschool age that are not provided through other federal, state, or local funds.
- Before-and-after school programs, mentoring, and summer programs for homeless children and youth.
- Education and training programs for parents of homeless children and youth regarding the rights their children have as homeless individuals and regarding the educational and other resources available to their children.
- Student services programs providing violence prevention counseling and referrals to such counseling.
- Programs addressing the particular needs of eligible students that may arise from domestic violence.

- its combined fiscal effort per student, or the aggregate expenditures of the LEA and the state with respect to the provisions of free public education by the LEA for the fiscal year preceding the fiscal year for which the determination is made, was not less than 90 percent of such combined fiscal effort or aggregate expenditures for the second fiscal year preceding the fiscal year for which the determination is made (unless the state receives a waiver).
- it complies with, or will use requested funds to comply with paragraphs (3) through (7) of section 722(g) of the McKinney-Vento Act.
- it will adopt policies and practices to ensure that homeless children and youths are not stigmatized or segregated on the basis of their status as homeless.
- it will designate an appropriate staff person, who may also be a coordinator for other federal programs, as a local educational agency liaison for homeless children and youths, to carry out the duties described in paragraph (6)(A).

- if the homeless student's living arrangement in the area served by the LEA of origin terminates and the student, though continuing his or her education in the school of origin, begins living in an area served by another LEA, the LEA of origin and the LEA in which the homeless student is living shall agree upon a method to apportion the responsibility and costs for providing the student with transportation to and from the school of origin. If the local educational agencies are unable to agree upon such method, the responsibility and costs for transportation shall be shared equally.

School Districts, Community Colleges, Universities and State Agencies

TALLAHASSEE — In the aftermath of four hurricanes, classes will have resumed in nearly 84% of Florida's school districts by Wednesday, September 29. Due to Hurricane Jeanne, classes are cancelled in 9 school districts, campuses at six community colleges, and one campus at a state university. Two additional school districts, one community college, and one university are still closed and recovering from Hurricane Ivan.

MINUTES
STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION
CONFERENCE CALL
September 20, 2005

Chairman F. Philip Handy convened the meeting of the State Board of Education via Conference Call, at 8:30 a.m., September 20, 2005, with the following members participating: Donna G. Callaway, Julia Johnson, Roberto Martinez, Phoebe Raulerson, and Linda K. Taylor. Vice Chairman Fair was unable to participate.

Welcome

Chairman Handy welcomed the members and thanked them for their indulgence in conducting the meeting as a conference call due to the projected impact of Tropical Storm Rita.

Chairman's Report

Chairman Handy thanked the Board Members for their cooperation and participation in the Commissioner's evaluation. Chairman Handy requested support from the Board in continuing discussions relating to compensation of the Commissioner and stated that follow-up would be provided. Each member of the Board expressed their support for the Chairman's representation on their behalf on matters relating to the Commissioner's compensation.

Chairman Handy welcomed Dr. Cheri Yecke as the Chancellor of K-12 Public Schools.

Chairman Handy reported that the Access Task Force met on September 14, 2005 and that clearly over the next 5 – 10 years there will be explosive growth in the demand for higher education.

Chairman Handy called for a motion to approve the minutes of the August 16, 2005, State Board meeting. Mrs. Taylor made the motion to approve the minutes with a second by Mrs. Callaway. The motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner's Report

Hurricane Katrina – Commissioner Winn reported that the Department had been actively involved in working with the Governor's Office and the Emergency Operations Center to assist long term evacuees from Mississippi, Louisiana, and Alabama. Two supplemental orders to the Governor's Executive Order enabled Florida's public schools, community colleges and state universities to open their doors to displaced students by removing state barriers to enrollment, including required documents for proof of residency, age, student records and birth certificates. In addition, the Department has established a nationwide, toll-free hotline to assist and parents and students of any age to obtain information on and access to resources to help them enroll in school in Florida.

School Recognition - Commissioner Winn reported that \$134 million dollars was distributed to high performing schools throughout the state.

FCAT – Commissioner Winn stated that a full version of the 10th grade FCAT test with answers would be released on Wednesday, September 21, 2005, and information will be provided on the difficulty of the questions, as well as how to use and not to use the test.

Career Education – Commissioner Winn provided an overview of the 4 point plan to promote and improve career education in the state and reported that this plan was announced in connection with the announcement of the Succeed Florida Grant Awards.

SUPPLEMENTAL ORDER/MISSION STATEMENT**

**ENROLLMENT AT FLORIDA PRIVATE SCHOOLS BY STUDENTS DISPLACED
BY HURRICANE KATRINA**

As a result of the devastating effects of Hurricane Katrina, students and their parents from other states have evacuated to Florida and wish to attend private schools while they are forced to reside in this state temporarily. Many of these students lack the required records to enroll either because such records were left behind in haste or destroyed.

Therefore, to the extent such records are unavailable as a result of Hurricane Katrina, Sections 1002.42(5) and (6), Florida Statutes, are waived to allow private schools to expeditiously enroll such students. Any student admitted to a private school as a result of this waiver shall have such waiver noted in their record by the admitting school. Such statutes shall be waived for initial enrollment for the duration of Executive Order 05-176, which will expire on October 23, 2005, and any extensions or modifications thereof.

**STATE COORDINATING OFFICER SUPPLEMENTAL ORDER/MISSION
STATEMENT**

**ENROLLMENT AT FLORIDA PUBLIC SCHOOLS BY STUDENTS DISPLACED BY
HURRICANE KATRINA**

As a result of the devastating effects of Hurricane Katrina, students and their parents from other states have evacuated to Florida and wish to attend public school while they are forced to reside in this state temporarily. Many of these students lack the required records to enroll either because such records were left behind in haste or destroyed. Therefore, to the extent such records are unavailable as a result of Hurricane Katrina, the following statutes and rules are waived to allow school districts to enroll students displaced by Hurricane Katrina without the necessary and customary documentation:

- Rule 6A-1.0985, Florida Administrative Code, to the extent necessary to allow Florida public school districts to admit such students where such records are unavailable to the parent of the student. Such rule shall be waived for initial enrollment for the duration of Executive Order 05-176 and any extensions or modifications thereof.

- Section 1003.21, Florida Statutes, to the extent it requires proof of age for attendance eligibility where such records are unavailable to the parent of the student. Such statute shall be waived for initial enrollment for the duration of Executive Order 05-176 and any extensions or modifications thereof.

- Section 1003.22, Florida Statutes, requiring presentation of a certification of a school-entry health examination where such records are unavailable to the parent of the student. Such statute shall be waived for initial enrollment for the duration of Executive Order 05-176 and any extensions or modifications thereof.


